1 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Good morning
2 and this is a scheduling conference in Case Number
3 24-0969-TF, tariff filing of Woodstock Aqueduct
4 Company for a change in rates pursuant to 30 V.S.A.
5 Section 225 effective on service rendered on or after
6 May 16, 2024. My name is Elizabeth Schilling. I'm a
7 Deputy General Counsel for the Public Utility
8 Commission and I've been appointed to be the hearing
9 officer in this matter. With me is Andrea Poppiti
10 who is an utility analyst with the Commission and is
11 also working on this case. I'll start by taking
12 appearances. If any party or participant intends to
13 record today's hearing via video or audio, please
14 indicate this when you provide your name for the
15 court reporter. I'll ask the parties to introduce
16 themselves in turn and I'll start with the
17 Department.

18 MR. GUZMAN: Good morning. Eric Guzman
19 on behalf of the Department of Public Service.

20 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Thank you.
21 Woodstock Aqueduct Company.

22 MR. McCLAIN: Good morning. My name is
23 Owen McClain from Sheehey Furlong & Behm representing
24 Woodstock Aqueduct Company, and Woodstock's water
25 manager Jireh Billings is on the call as well.

1 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Great.

2 Thank you.

3 MR. BILLINGS: Jireh Billings from
4 Woodstock Aqueduct Company.

5 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Thanks. So
6 yesterday on May 16, 2024 Woodstock Aqueduct Company
7 filed a proposed schedule in this proceeding and you
8 stated that the Department of Public Service was
9 agreeable with the proposed schedule. Did either
10 party have any addendums or additions you wanted to
11 mention regarding the schedule?

12 MR. McCLAIN: Not from us, no. I think
13 we worked on the schedule together and we like it and
14 we're happy to discuss any questions, but I think
15 it's good from our perspective.

16 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Great. So I
17 see that the schedule includes an information session
18 to be led by the Department and a public hearing on
19 Thursday, June 6, 2024. Does anyone have any
20 objections to holding those virtually with the
21 information session starting at 6:30 p.m. and then
22 the public hearing starting immediately following at
23 7 but no earlier than 7 p.m.

24 MR. McCLAIN: No. At least from
25 Woodstock's perspective we don't have an objection to

1 doing it remotely. I know the Commission has been
2 doing all of these -- just as a point of reference
3 there's been a lot of public discussion about the
4 water company in Woodstock and the town has actually
5 held some information sessions regarding the
6 potential sale of the company and those have been in
7 person. So, you know, we're happy to provide further
8 information around what sort of has been going on in
9 Woodstock if that's helpful to the Commission, but --

10 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Would there
11 be a preference to hold it in person somewhere in
12 Woodstock?

13 MR. McCLAIN: I think that we have a
14 slight preference for it to be in person.

15 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Okay.

16 MR. McCLAIN: That's right, right,
17 Jireh? I think we talked about that. I mean I
18 think, you know, it's -- the other meetings have been
19 in person down there and there might be sort of an
20 advantage to consistency with, you know, for people,
21 for customers and for residents that have, you know,
22 have participated or would like to come down and talk
23 to people. So, you know, like I said I don't think
24 we have an objection, but if the Commission was
25 interested, we would also be happy to do it in

1 person.

2 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Is there an
3 in-person location that you all would be able to
4 secure for us for that?

5 MR. BILLINGS: I'm usually able to
6 secure the Town Hall.

7 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: The Town
8 Hall?

9 MR. BILLINGS: Yes.

10 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Okay.

11 MR. McCLAIN: Jireh, correct me if I'm
12 wrong, we're not certain that the Town Hall would be
13 available to us at that precise hour on that precise
14 date, are we?

15 MR. BILLINGS: Right. If I got that
16 nailed down if it needed to be had, I could find out
17 by the beginning of next week if it were possible.

18 MR. McCLAIN: Okay yeah.

19 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Okay. Well
20 if you were able to file something with us by say
21 next Wednesday, May 22nd, regarding the location --

22 MR. McCLAIN: Yeah we can do that. I
23 mean how does this sound? Why don't we see if we can
24 secure the Town Hall for the June 6th date and we'll
25 file something indicating that that is possible

1 before next Wednesday, and in the event it's not
2 available, we'll indicate that and we can have it
3 virtually I suppose.

4 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Okay. So I
5 could issue a schedule stating that the public
6 hearing will happen on the 6th and stating something
7 about will follow up with information about whether
8 it would be held virtually or in person.

9 MR. McCLAIN: Okay.

10 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Let's see
11 what else. How does Woodstock Aqueduct plan to
12 provide notice to its customers of the information
13 session and public hearing?

14 MR. McCLAIN: So we have provided a
15 broad on -- already sent out on bill customer notice
16 of the proceeding consistent with the earlier sort of
17 part of the transaction with the Commission. I think
18 probably the most effective and timely thing is to --
19 is to publish something locally. Jireh, can we
20 publish something in the paper or post it on a public
21 -- what's the best way to, you know, provide --

22 MR. BILLINGS: We have the local paper,
23 the Vermont Standard, and I'm sure we can get it in
24 there.

25 MR. McCLAIN: How often does that get

1 issued?

2 MR. BILLINGS: Once a week.

3 MR. McCLAIN: Okay and so if we have a
4 -- if we have -- let's see June 6, if we have -- yeah
5 so -- so yeah if we decide that early next week then
6 we could -- we could get it into the paper next week
7 or that following week, the week in advance of the --
8 of the public hearing if that works.

9 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Yes that
10 sounds appropriate. That sounds good. Let's see
11 what other items did I have? The schedule includes
12 the week of October 7, 2024 for the evidentiary
13 hearing. Are there any objections to going ahead and
14 scheduling that for Tuesday, October 8?

15 MR. GUZMAN: No objection from the
16 Department. We would be available then.

17 MR. McCLAIN: That works for me. Jireh,
18 does Tuesday the 8th work for you if we have to have
19 an evidentiary hearing?

20 MR. BILLINGS: Yes it will.

21 MR. McCLAIN: Thank you.

22 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: Thank you,
23 and then I was hoping to set a deadline for Woodstock
24 Aqueduct to file any responses to public comments
25 that have been received up to this point and I was

1 thinking setting a deadline of June 5, 2024 which
2 would be before the public hearing just to provide
3 any responses that you might have to the public
4 comments that have been filed up until that date.
5 Any objections to that?

6 MR. McCLAIN: No not at all, but I just
7 out of curiosity just because I'm not -- I'm not used
8 to having my client file responses to public comments
9 necessarily, is that something that you would like us
10 to do because I think we're happy to do it.

11 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: It can be
12 helpful especially if there are like particular
13 points or questions that have been raised in the
14 public comments that would be useful to address in
15 writing especially in light of the public hearing.

16 MR. McCLAIN: I think that's definitely
17 doable. For example, some of the public comments
18 have suggested that there's been a lack of investment
19 in the water system and I think we plan to present
20 during the information session some information --
21 general background information so that people are a
22 little more informed about what's going on at the
23 Woodstock Aqueduct, but we're happy to file similar
24 information just about -- I don't want to overstate
25 it, but my understanding talking to Jireh there's

1 been quite a long and concerted effort to make lots
2 of investment in the water company. So that's one
3 point I think we might -- we might respond to if that
4 made sense.

5 You know the company's ongoing
6 maintenance has included lots of different things
7 including installing wells, changing the -- changing
8 the -- they used to have like -- they had -- they
9 used to have like a reservoir, an open air reservoir,
10 and so a lot of these are driven by the water supply
11 side so we had to -- now it's supplied by a well.
12 There's a big tank, there's a lot of distribution
13 line for that, there's all kinds of work that -- so
14 there's been a lot of stuff we can talk about. The
15 other --

16 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: I think that
17 type of information like that that you can provide in
18 writing is just helpful to address in comments.

19 MR. McCLAIN: We can do that. What
20 format should -- would you like us --

21 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: A letter is
22 fine and you can say this is in response to these
23 particular public comments filed on these dates and
24 just a letter.

25 MR. McCLAIN: Not as like prefiled

1 testimony?

2 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: No not as
3 prefiled testimony or a motion. Great. Thank you.
4 So is there anything else related to this schedule
5 that the parties would like to discuss today?

6 MR. McCLAIN: Not from our perspective,
7 no. I think we're good.

8 MR. GUZMAN: Nothing from the
9 Department.

10 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: And then
11 anything else in general regarding the case the
12 parties wanted to bring up today?

13 MR. McCLAIN: No. I mean I think -- I
14 think you know we've -- we've -- we've -- we're
15 looking forward to, you know, working with folks that
16 get involved. I mean obviously there's been a lot of
17 interest in this in Woodstock and so, you know, the
18 schedule I think is -- provides a nice sort of long
19 runway for us to all share information. It is my
20 hope and ambition that, you know, once the Department
21 files its testimony that we might be able to sort of
22 expedite the resolution of the case at that point and
23 not have too much additional process. So I guess --
24 I guess it is my hope that we might be able to
25 shorten things up if that's possible, but we're

1 certainly happy to -- to go through all the steps
2 here as well.

3 HEARING OFFICER SCHILLING: All right.
4 Well thanks for participating this morning and if
5 there's nothing further, we're adjourned. Thank you
6 all.
