SCHEDULING CONFERENCE ORDER

On October 2, 2025, Williston G Katie Lane Solar, LLC (the “Petitioner”) filed a petition for a certificate of public good under 30 V.S.A. § 248(a) to construct a 2.9 MW solar electric generation facility in Williston, Vermont (the “Facility”).

On November 13, 2025, I held a scheduling conference in this matter. Appearances were entered by Matthew Bakerpoole, Vermont Department of Public Service (“Department”); Anthony Iarrapino, Wilschek Iarrapino Law Office, PLLC, on behalf of the Petitioner; and Donald J. Einhorn, Vermont Agency of Natural Resources (“ANR”). In addition, the scheduling conference was attended by Jake Clark and Rebecca Gilbert from Encore Renewable Development and Annette Smith with Vermonters for a Clean Environment.

Prior to the scheduling conference, the Petitioner, the Department, ANR, and the Vermont Agency of Agriculture Food & Markets developed a proposed procedural schedule. I adopt the schedule as proposed by the parties, except that I set a deadline for motions to intervene for one week after the date of this order.¹

¹ “Non-petitioners” are all parties to this case other than the petitioner; non-petitioners include intervenors and statutory parties.

Date	Event
December 10, 2025	Deadline for motions to intervene and request for public hearing and site visit (responses to be filed within 7 days motions are filed)
December 11, 2025	Deadline for first round of discovery to be served on the Petitioner
January 6, 2026	Petitioner's responses to first round of discovery
January 27, 2026	Deadline for second round of discovery to be served on the Petitioner
February 10, 2026	Petitioners' responses to second round of discovery
March 10, 2026	Deadline for filing memoranda of understanding and/or comments
March 23, 2026	Deadline for filing non-adversarial non-petitioner testimony
March 30, 2026	Deadline for Petitioner's rebuttal testimony
March 30, 2026	Deadline for requests for evidentiary hearing, and/or proposed schedules for remainder of litigation, if contested issues remain
April 13, 2026	Petitioner submits proposal for decision, if no evidentiary hearing is requested

If motions for summary judgment are filed in this case, then, consistent with Commission Rule 2.219(B) and unless different deadlines are established by the Commission, (1) responses are due 30 days after the motion is filed; and (2) replies to any responses are due 14 days after the responses are filed. If motions to dismiss are filed in this case, then, consistent with Commission Rule 2.206(E), (1) responses are due 30 days after the motion is filed; and (2) replies to any responses are due 14 days after the responses are filed.² For any other motions, then, consistent with Commission Rule 2.206(E) and unless different deadlines are established by the Commission, (1) responses are due 14 days after the motion is filed; and (2) replies to any

² Commission Rule 2.206(E) provides the Commission with discretion to set response and reply deadlines that differ from the 14 days normally provided by that rule.

responses are due 14 days after the responses are filed. Consistent with Commission Rule 2.206(F), surreplies may only be filed with permission from the Commission.

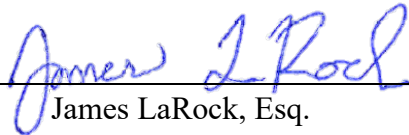
Parties are reminded that documents submitted in pdf format should be in an “unlocked” format, i.e., searchable and extractable, rather than in an image format.
